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## Bucklebury Parish Chairman's Letter

A piece of good news: the defibrillator outside Peach's Stores has been put in place (Jan14th). BPC are indebted to Dorothy Dugdale, Hash Shingadia and Heartstart Thatcham for all their help and encouragement and Councillors Anne Hillerton and Tim Slatford who have worked very hard to enable the plans to come to fruition. Several more defibrillators are planned for the parish. Donations boxes are available.

The second piece of good news is that the precept will remain the same in 2016/17.

The Bladebone is now listed as a community asset which means that should it ever come on the market parishioners would be in a position to have some say in its future. Applications applying for Peach's Stores and The Cottage Inn to become community assets will be made this year.

The transfer of the meadows to the parish: we await the answer to one final legal query. Maybe by the next Oaks...!

In December, 19 members of West Berkshire Countryside Society spent the day planting hedging and clearing scrub in the meadows. We are extremely grateful to them for their time and expertise and to Richard Hubbard who masterminded the

day.

The air raid siren which was housed in the church tower of St. Mary's Church during the Second World War is now back there, having spent many intervening years in local museums. It is now surplus to their requirements, hence it's return.

Traffic. Concern has been raised about traffic along the road near St. Mary's Church, near the Cottage Inn and parking at Peach's garage. Glyn Davies, an officer from WBC traffic department has visited all the sites. "Slow" signs will be put up on Broad Lane and near the church. Other measures will be put in place near the church. It is hoped the footpath will be painted adjacent to the road by Peach's Garage.

BPC have been very concerned about the proposal to remove the school bus for pupils attending Kennet School and have been liaising with various involved parties.

BPC would like to thank all the people who worked so hard last year to make Bucklebury such a pleasant place in which to live and wish you all every good wish for 2016.

## Parish Council Matters Arising

## Public Access Defibrillators EVERYONE: READ THIS! YES! YOU TOO!

With donations given in memory of Chris Baxter, funding from Bucklebury Parish Council, and the support of Hash and Chan Shingadia, a Public Access Defibrillator has been installed at Peach's Stores, Upper Bucklebury, by the Heartstart Thatcham team.

It has been placed externally on the side wall at Peach's so that access is available 24/7 for all residents of Upper Bucklebury and surrounding area and their families and visitors. Please go and familiarise yourself with its exact position so that in an emergency you know where to find it.

Here is the important bit: you do not need any training to use this device! If you find someone who has collapsed and you cannot get a response from them, ring 999 immediately. The call handler will talk you through a few checks, instruct you on starting CPR, and ask for a postcode. They will check their system for the nearest

defibrillator and ask you to send someone to get the defibrillator, giving you a code to get it from its case. Once the defibrillator is on the scene, the call handler will instruct you to switch it on. The machine then gives full verbal instructions and only delivers a shock if it is necessary. You **CANNOT** get it wrong, but you might be able to save a life.

# Further information on our defibrillators

As well as supplying a defibrillator in each of our four constituent villages, Bucklebury Parish Council's objective is to provide visibility and training such that parishioners are confident with the new equipment. During this year there will be opportunities to learn how to give CPR, and to try it out following the defibrillator's instructions on a dummy.

We would like ALL our teenagers to be trained in this. Teenagers react quickly and don't panic, so if we have all our youngsters trained we will have a good body of knowledge in our parish, now and for the future. There will be various training opportunities: dedicated courses are to be held in Bucklebury Memorial Hall, training within Scouts, Guides and Rangers as well as open training courses for people of all ages. Although the 999 call handler guides you through CPR, and the defibrillator itself gives all the necessary instructions, many of us would prefer to have run through the procedures first. Heartstart Thatcham is entirely volunteer run and will supply training for us. More details to follow.

## Planning

Once again, your councillors have been very busy looking at planning applications.

You will see on the list that the planning application for a solar farm at Mazelands Farm, Stanford Dingley is still pending a decision from WBC. Sufficient objections have been raised against this application that should the Planning Officer be minded to approve the application, it will automatically be considered by the Easter Area Planning Committee where District Councillors will determine whether the application is approved or refused.

There are a number of applications where the applicant has taken the decision of WBC to appeal. In each case WBC has agreed with the view of the BPC. The appeals are on the land at Siege Cross Farm (in Thatcham, north of the A4), at Fifeild Farm in Marlston and at Greenwood in Hatch Lane.

## WBC Councillors' Report

When this copy of The Oaks reaches you we will be well into the New Year, may we wish you a happy and healthy 2016!

Over the years we have suffered many cases of illegal driving on the common by 4x4 vehicles and off-road motorcycles. We have received many reports of such activity but I thought it was worth trying to give some guidance to parishioners on what to do if you see drivers acting irresponsibly.

Firstly it is legal for people to drive on "byways" that are not subject to a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) although to cause damage to the surface of the track is still an offence. Byways are easy to identify by entering "byways" on a search engine. Unfortunately there are some individuals, sadly too many, who abuse the law and illegally stray off the byway onto bridleways, footpaths and the common in search of deeper mud (which means more fun for them). We have responded to this by placing TROs on the most affected byways, most recently to those around Ramsbury Corner where Holly Lane joins Burdens Heath/The Ridge. This particular TRO has been recently extended until the end of June and reinforced with physical measures to make vehicular access more difficult.

Sadly I received a report on January 17<sup>th</sup> of two 4x4 vehicles being stuck below Briff Farm that needed to be towed out by a tractor! I am pleased to report that the police attended and a notice (a "Section 59") was given to the drivers which means that if they are caught again they will have to pay a fine in addition to a daily storage fee and, if they continue to drive illegally, the police are able to confiscate their vehicles and destroy them.

I have asked the legal team at WBC to pursue a claim against the drivers to repair the damage they have caused on this occasion. This is where we ask for your help. The police are very aware of what has been happening and are very keen to help put a stop to this. I had a long conversation with our Neighbourhood Sergeant with the Thatcham Policing Team (Bucklebury/Downlands and Rural Crime) today and this is the advice he gave:

- If you notice anyone driving illegally on the common then report it immediately to the police on 101 (the non-emergency number) giving as many details of the location as possible.
- Record any information such as make of vehicle and registration number of the vehicles. If you are able to take a photograph for evidence it would assist the police but please be careful to do this discreetly as there have been reports of people being abusive!
- Give advance notice to the police if you know where this abuse of the common happens regularly in a particular location at a certain time. The common covers a large area but there are favoured tracks that are used and our PCSO Sarah Preston has asked for as much information as possible about which days and times the common is likely to be used and where.

Sarah can be contacted by email on sarah.preston@thamesvalley.pnn.police.uk. The police intend to target the worst affected areas in the near future but need as much local knowledge as possible.

If Bucklebury is targeted in this way then word will soon spread around the 4x4 community that they have to behave in a responsible and legal way or they risk losing their vehicles.

From 4x4 vehicles to 4x4 animals! I have been asked to remind some of our residents who ride horses on the common that whilst they are allowed to ride on bridleways, as well as byways, footpaths are not to be ridden on! Bucklebury is reputed to be one of the parishes in the UK with the largest number of public footpaths but they are intended only to be walked on and this is enforced by the laws.

For security reasons the WBC email addresses are changing over the next six months to a different format. The new addresses will be "firstname.last<u>name@westberks.gov.uk</u>" and can be used now although the original format will work in parallel for around six months to enable you to amend address books over a period of time.



### Where Chapel Row Begins and Ends in Bucklebury

What a muddle there has been regarding the location and description of Chapel Row of late. I have heard it called a village; the only village in Bucklebury is the area around our parish church of St. Mary's.

The top of the hill above Hillfoot is where Chapel Row begins. This is because the Magdalen Chapel once stood here, (see Page 49 of Bucklebury in Focus) and runs along the straight road to the Bladebone area, where it ends, hence its name Chapel Row.

When you enter The Avenue you leave Chapel Row behind. It is very confusing to see two Chapel Row signs in The Avenue. The Old Surgery was in Chapel Row, beside the Bladebone, but the new one is now in The Avenue, the most historical address in Bucklebury.

At the other end of The Avenue are the new commemorative posts for the Royal Wedding, which have been described as being in South End Road. They are definitely in our lovely avenue, where the old common gates once stood.

We are all so very fortunate to live in Bucklebury. I was born here and I think it is very important our parish heritage is maintained.

#### Walk - The Coronation Oak

On leaving the Memorial Hall car park, turn left, cross the road and take the footpath just before The Cottage Inn. Go through all the swing gates to the far side of the fields. At the end turn slightly right towards the road and then turn right on to the road itself. Take the bridleway on the left a little way along the road.

Follow this footpath and at the Y junction bear left then slightly right through the holly bushes and behind the cemetery until you come out into a lane. Turn right and follow the byway, past Greens Old Farm on the left, to the road and then turn left. Follow this quiet road to Angel's Corner *(Scout Camp site)*, and keeping the camp on your left, walk through the layby noting the purple Bucklebury Map on the left.

To get to the Coronation Oak follow the gravel track, a restricted byway, round to the left and you will pass a house set back on your left, Foxhold, and then a driveway of the house down in a dip (*Osgood's Gully*).

Opposite the thatched barn/garage belonging to Osgood's Gully turn right along a narrow public right of way, which leads to the Coronation Oak. Keep left at the large silver birch tree and watch out for roots! The Coronation Oak will be on your right in a small clearing - you will note a plaque on the tree with details of the number of parishioners who attended a service there in 1902 to celebrate the coronation of King Edward VII.

Carry on along the same path and at the end, opposite Bucklebury Farm Park fence, turn left, and follow this path back to the main restricted byway. Turn left and follow this path back towards Angel's Corner, but just past the thatched garage to Osgood's Gully bear left onto a public right of way, follow the signs on the wide path and then turn left onto the main route parallel to the common road.

At the end, the lane meets a narrow road, turn right onto the road and then at the crossroads go straight over the main common road, look out for a foot path on your left, which leads across open common covered with heather towards a clump of trees. Turn right at the trees following the red byway sign. This again crosses the common, which could be wet if there has been a lot of rain, and at the end turn right and follow path to the road. Go straight across the road and into the lane to follow this back towards Upper Bucklebury, bearing right just before the Bucklebury Estate sign. Further along this lane you will notice a parallel footpath to your left – follow this path past "Tomlins" to a narrow road, turn right and cross this road to a footpath on the left back to The Memorial Hall on your left.

## History of Bucklebury Cecilia Millson

After the war, when she and her husband came to live in Bucklebury, Mrs. Cecilia Millson produced some historical scenes for the Women's Institute. In her research she had to delve into the history of Bucklebury and in doing so she became interested personally. Mrs. Millson kindly agreed to write a series of articles on Bucklebury for the magazine, and were first printed cir 1973.

#### Part III

Two national events of the 16<sup>th</sup> century brought changes to Bucklebury. In 1538 it was decreed by Thomas Cromwell, Vice-regent to King Henry VIII in ecclesiastical matters, that all baptisms, marriages and burials must be recorded. Bucklebury started its Parish Register with the entry:- "1538 Margaret Iremonger was baptised the 11th daie of ffebruarye"

And so commenced a record of the lives of the villagers throughout the generations.

In 1540, after the Dissolution of the Monastries, the manors of Bucklebury and Thatcham were granted by Henry VIII to John Winchcombe, son of the wealthy woollen merchant, Jack of Newbury. In return the King received the sum of  $\pounds 2,619$  13s. 4d.

John Winchcombe demolished the Abbot's house and replaced it with a fine Tudor manor house. He died before it was completed and his son, John, was the first Winchcombe to live in Bucklebury. A charitable man, he made many grants to the poor of his manors, and charged his son and heir, John, to honour these bequests. The young man did not long survive his father, and it was the second son, Francis, who faithfully discharged his father's legacies. Francis left his mark on Bucklebury Church. He rebuilt the chancel and, although further restorations have been carried out, the great tie beam records:

"1591. Francis Winchcom Esquire build this"

He may have done this good work to commemorate the honour bestowed upon him in 1590 when he was made High Sheriff of Berkshire, an office he held again in 1606.

It is thought that Queen Elizabeth I visited Bucklebury on one of her tours around her Kingdom, and that oak trees were planted to mark the occasion of her visit. Proof may never be found, but the tradition provided an excuse to present an Elizabethan pageant when our own Queen was crowned just twenty years ago, The medieval fishponds in the manor grounds made a picturesque setting for these revels, and a decorated punt carried the madrigal singers to the centre of the ponds to sing to the "Queen" and her courtiers, and a large gathering of friends seated around the grounds. Everyone was relieved when the punt reached the safety of the bank once again, the intrepid singers being none the worse for their venture, except for bites from the mosquitoes, no doubt infuriated at being disturbed by the colourful invasion on the still waters of the ancient ponds.

## The Ramblers Work Party ( RWP )

The RWP started when West Berkshire Council's Rights of Way (RoW) department asked for help with a joint project with Mencap who were looking for an outdoor activity for their members. We worked with Mencap for a number years and then with another group of disabled volunteers clearing vegetation from footpaths.

In 2003 we formed a separate group just for Ramblers, although the disabled volunteer group also continued up until this year when for various reasons it has stopped. The gate project started in 2005.

The RWP group works parish by parish walking all the Rights of Way in each parish. We check each RoW against data from WBC and carry out low level maintenance, clearing vegetation, collecting litter and putting in waymarks. Reporting back to the Council is an important element of the work.

Bucklebury parish has over 160 RoW, which is reputed to be the most RoW of any parish in England, and, coupled with the Common, it is a special challenge. The number of unofficial paths across the Common makes it difficult for the outsider to follow a route. However, over the years it has become better signed but the unwary can still get lost.

The RWP can claim that there has been improvement in the paths of West Berkshire but paths are organic and vegetation grows at a phenomenal rate, wooden posts rot and metal ones rust, gates sag and fall off their hinges. A sharp eye has to be kept to ensure that the RoW are not being abused by those who would block, divert or build over our precious and possibly unique resource.

The most helpful thing anyone can do to help the RoW is to report as accurately as possible any fault which is found when out walking. WBC has a good online reporting system for faults or, a telephone call to the main switchboard will be put through to the RoW department.

Over the years 9 gates have been put in and the RWP have worked in the parish in 3 times, 2006, 2010 and 2014. Bucklebury parish is a lovely, diverse parish and the group enjoys the hospitality of the Cottage after a morning's work.
