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# Bucklebury Parish Chairman's Letter

As we all gear up once again after the summer break we have to report that the Meadows still have not been transferred to Bucklebury Parish Council (BPC). The reason for the delay is that David Wilson Homes have not to date supplied a definitive map of the meadows to accompany the transfer document. Once this is in our possession, the transfer documents can be signed.

On 11<sup>th</sup> November the West Berkshire Countryside Society will be working on the meadows, repairing gaps in the hedges and if there is time planting a hedge between the field owned by the Cottage Inn and the first meadow. We are very grateful for their ongoing help and support.

The other matter we have been concerned about is that when property owners have purchased agricultural land adjacent to their domestic curtilage (i.e. gardens!) they do not always seem to be aware that this can only become part of their garden if they apply for planning permission and this is subsequently granted. There are important planning reasons why this should be done. Those residents, of whom BPC are aware, who fall into this category will receive letters from BPC alerting them to the planning laws.

The work of felling mature trees and clearing fallen ones in Blacklands Copse is going well. BPC worked closely with the land owner, lease holder and contractor to ensure that parishioners concerns were dealt with. The programme of work is on the BPC web site (www.buckleburyparish.org).

We had reports of uncovered manholes on the common, left over from the camps that were there during the Second World War. Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust (BBOWT), who now manage the common have generously volunteered to fill them in.

The river Pang has been monitored all year for evidence of misuse by 4x4's. Fortunately the measures taken to make it difficult to take vehicles into the Pang, have deterred them. Posts will be erected in the bed of the Pang to further discourage misuse. We are grateful for the expertise of Sally Wallington, who works for WBC, for her expertise and help. The situation will continue to be monitored. The misuse of 4x4's and other vehicles on the common is also being monitored. CCTV cameras will be placed in strategic places shortly.

On 9th June the members of BBOWT responsible for organising and carrying out field work spent the day in Bucklebury familiarizing themselves with the work being carried out in various parts of the parish. They were very impressed by the work the Bucklebury Heathland Group had done during the winter. They had a picnic on the Hockett Field and in the afternoon looked at the area of the Lower Common which was cleared of birch scrub and returned to heathland some years ago. We hope to host a family event on one of the meadows with BBOWT next summer.

Common Clearing is on Saturday 11th October. Teas and delicious cakes will be provided as usual.

BPC would like to thank all those people who work so hard to make Bucklebury such a pleasant and friendly place in which to live.

# Parish Council Matters Arising

## **Bucklebury Cemetery**



After having the chapel surveyed, it became apparent that the roof needed attention. We were very fortunate to employ the services of Steve Christmas, who specializes in repairing old buildings. He has replaced the roof battens, purchased old tiles and replaced the broken ones so that the roof does not look as though it has been refurbished.

He has done an excellent job. While he was on the roof he also gave the bell and its casings some much needed TLC and attached a rope, so for the first time in many years we will be able to ring the bell. We will of course ring it on the evening of our Candlelit Carols on Monday 22nd December! Which, as usual, will be from 6.00pm-7.00pm.

Alan Dunkerton and I carried out a survey of the grave markers to ascertain which were unsafe. This will be carried out annually in future to comply with insurance regulations. Grave markers are the responsibility of the family or friends of the people buried. However we found some graves in need of attention in the old part of the cemetery, so it didn't seem practical to try to find the families. Steve Christmas very kindly offered to do the small necessary repairs while he was on site and these have been done.

With time, some of the graves have sunk and these will be filled in shortly so that they don't cause a hazard.

BPC will hold a working party in the cemetery on Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> September at 10.00am. We will cut back some of the rhododendrons that are obscuring some graves and the brush that has grown up between the newest section of the cemetery and the woodland. It is hoped this will enhance this part of the cemetery.

The clerk will publish an update of the cemetery regulations shortly


# **Planning**

As many of you are aware, BPC is consulted by WBC on the majority of planning applications submitted for locations in the parish. In reality this means a minimum of two councillors being allocated the application, who will then look at the documents submitted. They will then make a site visit and possibly visit neighbours before reporting back to either the full Council or the Planning Committee (dependent on when in the month observations have to be returned to WBC). The Council or Planning Committee then makes its recommendations which are normally either "no objection" or "object". If it is decided to "object" reasons for the decision are also sent to WBC. Once received the WBC planning officer considers the observations of the Parish Council when deciding whether to approve or refuse an application.

# WBC Councillors' Report

As far as our Parish is concerned we have had a relatively quiet summer concerning District Council business, many of the road repairs and improvements reported in previous recent issues of The Oaks have been completed and we have received many favourable comments. Please do, however, report any issues that concern you either to us or directly to the Call Centre at the Council (01635 42400).

Earlier in the year all Parishes were asked to highlight roadside flooding problems. Now that major work either has been completed or is in progress on problem areas where property could be affected (for example in the Lambourn Valley, in Purley-on-Thames and in Southend Cold Ash) we are turning our attention to some of the more minor areas; roads such as the road between Bucklebury Village and Marlston and the stretch of road between Burdens Heath and The Ridge, Cold Ash. Some of the problems are caused by the riparian owners (those who own the ditch or waterway) not maintaining the drainage ditches effectively and the Council is working with these people to ensure that water can drain off the highway correctly. This is important work as water is one of the main causes of the road surface breaking up.

Autumn is always the time when we start assessing the Council's budget; this time last year we consulted on a two year proposal with the intention of not raising Council tax next May. We are now in the process of checking the figures to ensure this can be achieved without reducing frontline services. Planning issues are always of interest to residents (nothing causes more controversy in some cases!); we are currently consulting on a number of proposals to allow us to complete our Local Plan but there are no sites being considered in Bucklebury. Next year there will be a change in the way in which we will collect money for infrastructure improvements from new houses being built (now called a "section 106 agreement") and a considerable amount of work is being done to ensure that we have money for these improvements when new properties are built. The new system is called the "Community Infrastructure Levy" or CIL and is based on the number of bedrooms a new house has and its location.

The 2014 Flu Vaccination programme begins in October 2014 and the surgery is operating its annual Flu Clinic on Saturday 18th October 2014.

- As this clinic is always a busy time, the Nurses will take patients for their vaccination, in order of the time slot indicated to patients when booking into the clinic.
- Please could patients **Be Prepared** for their vaccination by removing any clothing which covers the preferred arm for the vaccination.
- Unfortunately if patients arrive early, the Nurses may not be able to see them until their allotted appointment time, unless the clinic is running ahead of schedule. It may be possible to see patients early if there is an available gap in the schedule, but early arrivals may have to wait until their indicated time.
- Equally if patients arrive later than their allocated time slot, the patient will be fitted in at the nearest possible time, which may mean a long wait if other patients have already arrived for their allotted vaccination time slot.

**Please be "A Patient Patient"**, you will be seen as soon as we can.

You can participate and input into the surgery by attending The Patient Participation Group meetings held 5 times a year. The next one being Thursday 15th January 2015.

# Restoration of the old Water Mill in Bucklebury Village

Many Parishioners will be aware that a small group of us have been trying to find grant funding to restore this historic old mill back to full working order. As you know it was badly damaged by fire when the adjoining old barn burnt down back in 1996. But all the essential machinery, gearing, grinding stones, wheel etc. were saved intact. A lot of work was done to assess support for its restoration, obtain quotes and get planning consent a year or so before the floods of 2007. We then had to wait for the flood defences to be installed before progressing which took us to 2011. Although we now have full planning consent for this listed building, including its use for educational purposes, and following 5 separate applications for funding from the major national and local grant-funders, we have been

disappointed and sadly have failed in our efforts. This is despite significant enthusiastic support from schools and educational trusts in the district and endorsement of our efforts by the Environment Agency and our own parish council, as well as considerable enthusiasm from numerous parish residents and the Pang Valley Conservation Volunteers. It would seem that, although the cost is quoted at less than £50,000 and despite being short-listed each time, the grant-funders simply have too many calls on their funds to be able to help.

So this article is to update everyone on the situation. It is still theoretically possible to raise money through individual approaches to quite a number of charitable trusts (we know of over 30 such) and it would even be possible to set up a formal crowd-funding scheme. Unfortunately this takes a fair bit of time but a group of say 6 or 8 people could easily handle it. I, am retiring from the project but will work with anyone else who would like to take over. The planning consents have more than two years to run and are renewable. All the work is quoted for and readily activated. If anyone would like to take this on perhaps they could let the Bucklebury Estate or the undersigned know and we can readily put something together. Meanwhile I am afraid to say this very worthwhile and historical project is now in abeyance and a unique opportunity may be gone forever. The old mill is now only a ruin but its full restoration is not very difficult. I look forward to hearing from any enthusiasts who might be interested.

# **Building of The Slade Chapel**

(Copied from "The Gospel Herald" no 1569 November 1963.)

There lived in the early part of the nineteenth century a farmer by the name of **Mr. JOHN MORTON**, with his gracious wife, both of them living witnesses to the Grace of God. Mr Morton ran Holly Farm with great care both for the land and for those who worked for him. He was also minister of the Independent Chapel which stood a mile away at the opposite end of the large common. There he carried on good work, and large crowds attended.

Amongst his girls and boys who attended with their mother was one **JOHN**, named after his father. John was a very serious minded boy, and it soon became evident that God was calling him for special service. Soon he confessed himself a Christian and his mind was much concerned about baptism. He was baptised in the river which runs right through the village of Bucklebury, about two miles from the Slade.

He soon began open air services with the two young men who were baptised with him, **Mr. ALLUM** and **Mr. COXETER**. He preached that baptism should be by immersion, and this

caused a big upset in his father's church.

Possibly his father and mother were in sympathy with him, but we cannot be sure. John kept to the point, and preached fearlessly, and many were baptised in the same river. One young person named **MARY PIKE** was baptised and she afterwards became Mrs. JOHN MORTON. They lived in a cottage newly built. Here they held prayer meetings, while the open air meetings continued.

My own mother was baptised, but my father was very bitter about it. There was a lot of unpleasantness all round, but the Baptists held on to their prayer meetings. Then the landlord of John's house gave him notice, because he said that so many people would wear out the floor. He told the people at the next meeting, and his mother sent over sacks to cover the floor, and the meetings went on with the house full of praying men and women.

Much prayer was offered regarding the building of a Chapel where they might worship in the bad weather; also they needed a place nearer than the Independent Chapel. None of them had any money to spare for this purpose.

At last they went to my Grandfather, **Mr RICHARD TULL**. He was a Plymouth Brother, and a very gracious man. He said that they could have a piece of land at the back of the cottage but they would have to build the Chapel so that it could be taken down again as, after his death, the land would belong to his son, who was Superintendent of the Independent Chapel.

They therefore built in the orchard a chapel of wood upon four brick columns. There were four steps leading up to the door, and there were two windows on either side. The inside was panelled in light brown, and a small pulpit stood across one corner like a half moon. The seats were long forms with a piece of wood at the back. They were very hard, the sermons were long, and I remember how my young back often ached. The last hymn was very welcome.

A Sunday School was started, but at first we were not allowed to go. One Sunday afternoon my sister, Nellie, and my brother, Tom, were taken to the Independent Sunday School, but on the way Tom was bitten by an Adder. By the time he arrived there he was black, and soon unconscious. He was carried home, the doctor was sent for, and he was seriously ill for many weeks. After this we all went to the Baptist Sunday School.

When I was eight years old the friends saw that my grandfather was getting very old, and they discussed what they should do about the Chapel. There were many difficulties. Mr. John Morton had been called to a large Chapel far away. Mr. Allum was thinking of going with his family to America. Mr. Coxeter said that he would stay with his little flock. Mr. Milsom, who had been with the people all through, took over the superintendency of the Sunday School. He was a good man, and we loved him. Mr. Coxeter was looking around for a piece of land where we could find a home for our Chapel. At last he

bought a cottage with a very nice entrance into the orchard, with ample room for the Chapel to stand inside the gate.

Now, the next thing was to move the Chapel from the orchard, up the hill into the new home where they were already preparing a Baptistry. Mr. Milsom arranged to bring four big wagon wheels and two very strong horses. He fixed the wheels by some means to the Chapel where the four brick columns were, and the two horses were attached to the front of the Chapel. We all pushed when the word was given, and we rested when we were told, and we pushed our dear little Chapel out of the orchard and up the very stony hill and into its last resting place.

About that time Mr. FRANK GRIMWOOD became very interested in the little chapel. He was living in Newbury, a market town some five miles away, and he was apprenticed to a building firm. He was baptised at the age of sixteen by the Rev. KNIGHT of Newbury, but eventually joined our little chapel in the Slade. When he finished his time he went as an improver to a firm at East Woodhay. One day he told the builder the history of the little chapel, and Mr. CARLEY rode over with Frank to see the place. He said "I will put up a permanent building for £100". The people were very serious because they were all poor, but they prayed in faith, and the new brick building began to materialise. They built all round the little wooden Chapel, and put on the roof without disturbing the Sunday Services or the week-evening prayer meeting. The pulpit was put in the new Chapel, and the very hard seats. The same windows were used but made a little longer. Mr. Coxeter continued his ministry, and baptised not a few. I was baptised with my sister, Emily, and two other girls on May 20th 1893.

The Sunday School was carried on by the Superintendent, with a few helpers. Mr. Frank Grimwood remained with the cause until he moved away to London. In 1898 he became my own dear life partner, and we lived happily together for sixty-one and a half years, when on November 4<sup>th</sup> 1959 God took him suddenly from my side far beyond the reach of tears and sorrows.

Mr. Coxeter had passed on some years earlier. He died in his beloved Chapel while conducting a service. Mr. W. PRIOR, who had been such a help to the cause, carried on the work, but the long journey from Reading, coupled with a very delicate wife, made him retire. Then it was carried on by various members and friends until they passed to the other side.

Now I believe a gentleman belonging to the Newbury Baptist Church is engaged in the work there at Bucklebury Slade. In our days we used Gadsby's Hymns in the services, and a very dear little hymnbook in the Sunday School called Gems of Song.

That is how it came about that a Baptist Chapel was built in Bucklebury Slade, which has been a great blessing to many.

NOTE: This interesting story was sent to us (The Gospel Herald) by

MRS. ROSE GRIMWOOD, the widow of the late Pastor Frank Grimwood. She describes herself as the only one who can now recall the events here related, and we are grateful to her for this record of an age that now seems far removed from our own.]

(NOTE: Rose Grimwood lived from 1877 – 1965 and recorded her memories in a booklet which will, hopefully, be published in future copies of The Oaks. Helen Relf)

## Walk: Byles Green - Miles Green - Turner's Green - Hopgood's Green

This is a lovely walk in February / March due to the numerous snowdrops through Byles Green.

From The Memorial Hall car park turn left and cross the road to take the footpath on the right after Morton's Lane and before Three Crowns Cottage. Follow path across the fields to Byles Green turning left by Byles Green Farm and following the track to the road. Turn left and follow the road down the hill to the bend (lots of snowdrops along here and known locally as The Ups & Downs) — and take the Byway (wide lane) on the right leading down the hill (make sure you don't go too far down the road or you will miss this path) and then immediately left down a narrow

#### Bridleway.

Continue to the end when another path joins from the right, over a small stream and up the hill past Miles Green House on the right (can be muddy). Take the right hand lane to the road – turn left and immediately right (Bridleway) and then immediately left following the path parallel to the road. Bear right at cross paths towards Turner's Green and turn right again at the lane. (Note the plinth on the green opposite commemorating George Lailey, Bowl Turner, who had his hut on this site for many years).

Continue on down the hill past Furze Cottage, Camplin's Cottage and Underwood Cottage (this path can be wet and muddy!). Turn left at the T-paths past a pond on your right and keep straight on. Ignore the first small path on the left, cross the path, which leads to Briff Farm, and continue up until Hopgood's Cottage on the right hand side and then turn left on to Fanny's Lane.

Continue on the road until you see the car park on your right – take the Bridleway to the left opposite this car park. Continue across the common heading south until reaching the main lane, cross over and follow the left hand path of two down the hill back to Turner's Green.

Continue up the road and straight over the crossroads past the large oak tree and The Blitz on the right. Go over the next crossroads to Byles Green, past the buildings on the left hand side (can anyone tell me the history of these buildings?) and cottages on the right. Continue up the hill, round sharp bend and past Byles Green Farm again on the right. Further on take the narrow path (By Way) on the right to join a track and follow this back to the start.
