Parish Council Planning

A fair proportion of the Parish Council's time is still spent on dealing with planning applications. Once an application has been received from West Berks Council(WBC) it is allocated to 2 councillors who visit the site and the applicant. This is in order to get a fuller understanding of what is proposed, check the orange notice giving details of the application is prominently displayed and talk to the neighbours and others potentially affected. The councillors consider all they have seen and heard and make a recommendation to the next Planning Committee or full Parish Council Meeting. The applicant will have been told which of these it is to be so he or she can attend and speak if desired. After discussion the recommendation is either endorsed by the Council by a vote or if there are contentious issues or more information needed the full Council will ask for a further site visit before taking the application one more time. The Parish Council's decision, which is advisory to WBC, is either to support, object to or offer no objection to the application. A short written report goes forward to WBC giving the rationale for the decision with reference to the relevant Planning Policies, Guidance and Supplementary Planning Guidance(including the Parish Design Statement -Bucklebury Vision).

Bucklebury's Emergency Plan

REQUESTS FOR HELP

All parishes have been asked to produce an emergency plan so that if (as in the case of the floods of 2007) there is a sudden problem, the parish will be better equipped to deal with it.

We have produced a first draft following a template provided by West Berkshire Council. One of the requirements is to assess what local skills and resources we have.

We would like to draw up a list of people in the parish who may be able to help in an emergency. The list will be updated annually. Please let Helen Pratt the Parish Clerk know if:

• You are a trained first aider (and would be willing to be contacted in an emergency)

• You are a GP or nurse and living in the parish (as above)

- You own and drive a 4x4 vehicle (as above)
- You own and drive a tractor (as above)
- You own a working chain saw (as above)

The Parish Council will also be contacting local organisations which could be helpful in identifying vulnerable people in the community who may need extra help in an emergency.

The plan will be discussed again at the March meeting of the Parish Council, so please let Helen have any names and contact details by then.

Bucklebury Common Update

As usual on behalf of the Parish Council I have been working with WBC, The Police and Bucklebury Estate on the problems of Fly-tipping and illegal 4x4 usage.

This has been a relatively quiet period in terms of actual reports/captures – although we have had the usual off-road and fly-tipping activities.

Just a reminder, if vehicles don't have full insurance, tax and MOT it is illegal to drive on an unrestricted byway, and even with these they need to be considerate to others, not damage the service and observe road and bylaws. Driving anywhere off-road is illegal and needs to be reported and ideally photos taken.

Please continue to help report incidents – email: stevebeeson@yahoo.co.uk, tel: 01635 862918. We need vehicle registration numbers and photos! Please report flytipping to streetcare@westberks.gov.uk – they normally collect within 48 hours.

There have been reports of "mud-plugging" 4x4's (churning up tracks) which have been reported to the Police and WBC – letters and warnings will be sent. We have also contacted the illegal camper who stays on the Common occasionally – whilst this might seem harmless enough there are no sanitary arrangements and it could encourage other transient travellers. Also, there is actually a byelaw against camping. The byelaws are on the BPC website and the information board at the crossroads (if it has not been vandalised again).

The Hockett Field is privately owned by BPC and not to be used for motor cycles – if your children are doing this please stop them.

Please continue to be vigilant and report incidents and enjoy our fantastic countryside.

As a keen cyclist around the Common can I please remind all cyclists and parents with children who cycle that it is a good idea to use lights at all times on your bikes. Could you please check you have at least a rear light – especially if your children are riding to/from the BMX track.

Path through Carbins Wood

As many of you are aware, the main permitted path from east to west through Carbins Wood has been closed to the public since 2008 when there was a change of ownership of the middle part of the wood. When it became obvious that negotiation with the new landlord was not going to achieve a continuation of the permitted path through the wood, the Parish Council applied in June 2008 to West Berkshire for a modification order of the existing definitive map and statement of rights of way of the area. They requested a public byway through the wood from Hatch Lane in Chapel Row to where it meets up with public footpath 83/5, which runs from north to south.

As there was no sign that West Berkshire Council would be considering this case in the near future (they have a lengthy backlog of such cases) and as there was local concern about activities taking place in the wood, the Parish Council applied in 2011 to the Planning Inspectorate to have the case heard earlier.

In October 2011 the Planning Inspectorate decided there was a case for setting a date by which the application for the byway should be decided and formally ordered the local authority to determine the case by next April 2012.

The local authority already has copies of 35 user evidence forms, 2 petitions and other information, most of which were submitted in 2008. If anyone has any further evidence about the use of this path prior to 2008, they should contact Stuart Higgins in the Rights of Way department at West Berkshire Council. (shiggins@westberks.gov.uk)

Greening Bucklebury Launch Event

CONCERNED ABOUT RISING ENERGY BILLS? WANT TO REDUCE YOUR CARBON FOOTPRINT? THEN GREENING BUCKLEBURY IS FOR YOU!



A big thank-you to everyone who came to the Public Meeting on 28th September and chose 8 energy saving challenges for our community to take up after the Launch Event.

The Launch Event will take place on Saturday 28th January in the Memorial Hall from 2.30pm to 5pm. Helped by our young people, there will be information

on ways of saving money by reducing your consumption of energy and resources.

Your household's challenge card will be delivered through your door within 2 weeks from the Launch. We are asking each household to complete at least five challenges and then display the card in a front window before 10th March. Volunteers will count the displayed cards between 10th and 25th March. Then we can work out by how much Bucklebury has reduced its CO₂ emissions and energy bills overall.

The Greening Campaign challenges us to take on small changes in our way of living which when added up across the parish will add up to a significant difference. If each household achieves just 5 out of the 8 challenges that household could save \pounds 90/year and reduce their CO₂ emissions by 650 kg/year.

Watch out for the card through your door, take up the challenges and display the card so we can see what savings we have made together.

LEAF Funding

The government has just announced a £10 million funding pot called LEAF (Local Energy Assessment Fund). This funding is open to community groups and parish councils but needs to be spent by 31^{st} March 2012. DECC describes the fund as being designed to help communities to accelerate their activity on energy and climate change. It can pay for:

• energy surveys of buildings

• energy saving demonstration projects (exemplar homes or community spaces)

- workshops to help local people take action to save energy
- reports on what more needs to be done in your area (in the way of energy efficiency)
- engagement events ahead of the above studies to generate interest

Where the above has already been done the funding may be able to facilitate:

- area-wide renewable energy studies (to see what would work)
- feasibility studies into specific renewable energy projects

The money is not available for installing technologies which would benefit from Feed in Tariffs or the Renewable Heat Incentive, but could be used for studies into whether those technologies would be suitable.

WBC Councillors' Report

We have previously reported that a huge amount of work has been going on for the last two years to update the Local Plan (now called the Local Development Framework or LDF) on which planning policies and therefore decisions on planning applications will be determined. I am pleased to say that we are hopefully at the final consultation stage before a Planning Inspector signs off what is proposed. Locally for the Parish very little should change as no largescale developments are suggested in our area or elsewhere in the AONB (Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty). Much has been written about devolving planning powers to more local areas, for example Parish Councils, but the information we have as of now is that the District Council should still be where decisions will be made, based on the LDF and Planning Policies. It is worth noting that the status of the AONB has recently been enhanced to provide further protection against certain development.

It is still important for us to have a definite idea of the housing needs of the Parish and we do have specific policies to promote "affordable" housing so please find time to complete the Housing Needs Survey being distributed with this edition of The Oaks. Your views and knowledge are important to us so we can reflect the Parish's housing requirements in future planning policies.

Every year becomes more of a challenge when setting the Council budget against the background of the economic situation. We have made "efficiency" savings for the past few years but we are now reaching the stage of making some difficult choices. We are pleased to say that you should have no increase in Council Tax bills next May and we have protected front-line services especially those that could affect the vulnerable or elderly. We will continue our road improvement schemes (like the Forth Road Bridge I doubt we will ever complete these works but there have been many fewer potholes!) and will always ensure we have enough grit to cope with a severe winter which hopefully will be less harsh than last year. Some compromises have been made such as the alternate collection of the grey and green wheelie-bins, but we have introduced weekly collection of food waste to prevent problems with odours or vermin. The feedback we have had is mainly positive and most people have risen to the challenge of increasing recycling!

May we hope you had a peaceful Christmas and will enjoy a Healthy and prosperous New Year.

SOME MEMORIES OF BUCKLEBURY DURING WORLD WAR TWO

There was a searchlight in the field opposite Roselands in The Avenue, manned by 8 - 10 soldiers. There was also one in The Iron Church Meadow – the old gate is still there. Bob Wyatt played with the searchlights in the early evening and remembers the soldiers coming to the farm for milk. Water was piped to the field. There was a 10ft square hut in the field – the gateway was by Ryders – where Dr Bywater used to live. The searchlights were on trailers but never moved, as far as we are aware. Each searchlight had its own generator, which sometimes took 3 people to start it.

There were also searchlights in The Slade – one on the Lower Green and one on the Upper. There were huts on both greens and the generator was on the road.

There was also a Beacon halfway down Fanny's Lane. Incendiaries were dropped at Beenham.

All these searchlights were to help the defence of the air as there were aerodromes all around the Bucklebury area at Hampstead Norreys, Aldermaston etc. We think guns may have been sited at Theale at the depot on the present A4.

The Common Road was closed during the war and Bob's father had to have a licence for the milk lorries to pass through. Ann Tetlow can remember her father also having a licence as he was a teacher and had to travel to school regularly. There was a gate with a sentry box by the first crossroads.

Americans lived in tents (may have been Bell Tents) on The Avenue, near Cripps Farm, and grouped there prior to going overseas. The tents had slab floors with wooden pathways between them and when the Americans left they took the tents but left the floors and paths. These disappeared very quickly (recycled by the locals).

The Officer's Mess was by the old water tower (now demolished) at the crossroads.

The Americans left any excess food out to be collected as swill for the pigs but lots of it was still good so Bob's father used to take it into Reading when he was delivering milk, to share out.

There was also a Picture House down Hillier's Drive, where Bob can remember going to see films with the Americans, which were held every night. Joe can't remember the British troops in The Slade having such luxury. One bomb dropped on Bucklebury, where the house called The Blitz now stands, and Joe can remember being in a barn at Winchcombe Farm when it landed.

Bob can also remember the allotments between the Beenham Road and Hillier Drive and 6 ponds along the road, one remains at the Beenham turn but the others were filled in by council workmen.

We also talked about the Common Gates – some mentioned were the gate at Tyler's Lane, the top of Hatch Lane, Bradfield Gate near Kings Copse House (this was removed to a house near the surgery). Animals were kept on the Common and the gates used to stop them from roaming. Joe remembers opening and closing the Slade Gate.

There were two Pounds in Bucklebury – one at Brownsgate and one behind Haycroft in The Slade. The one at Brownsgate still exists today.

Thank you, Bob & Joe for coming along to the meeting and regaling us all with your memories. We are very interested to hear from other people who would like to tell us their memories – either at a future meeting or beforehand.

Also, a big thank you to Allayne Amos who decorated the History Group's Tree for the Christmas Tree Festival in The Victory Room. We hope you enjoyed looking at all the beautiful trees as much as we did.

(BEHIND BUCKLEBURY MEMORIAL HALL)

If you use the Playpark, have you noticed that there's something different about the tube-slide now? It works really well at last!

The Memorial Hall Management Committee persevered to ensure that the slide manufacturers came back on site last October to change the shape which now means that children (about 5 yrs old and over) would get a faster slide experience. This meant having to remove the bend which wasn't working very well and replacing two newlycustomised tube-components to create a simpler, straight design. The toddler slide is still well-used round the other side of the Multi-play Unit but finally we have a large tubeslide that enables users to ride all the way to the end.

Playground Facilities, the original Contractor, were also onsite to oversee the re-installation free of charge; complete some maintenance and, very kindly, they fixed the nestswing barrier which had once again succumbed to vandalism and needed to be made up-right again. The park has been subject to some minor vandalism from time-totime but fortunately our local, friendly, neighbourhood Special Constables are always "on the case".

The feedback received at a local level is generally extremely positive and there is enormous gratitude to everyone who

HOPGOOD'S GREEN, TYLER'S LANE, THE SLADE From The Cottage Inn turn left down the first footpath

across the fields to Byles Green and continue keeping the houses on your left. Turn left on to the road and then take the bridleway opposite Briar Cottage. Cross the road and follow the next bridleway to Turner's Green, turn right onto the main path and then left across the green past the houses and chapel on the right. Turn right onto the road and follow it down and round the corner to the bridge at the end.

Turn left at the T-junction and straight over at the cross paths. Turn right at the junction past Hopgood's Farm and then right onto the road. Continue down the road until you meet Tyler's Lane and

there go straight over on the Byway/FP and follow the footpath across the field, up the hill and down the other side. Left at the next FP sign and keep left at the Y-junction, turn right and follow the arrows (middle of two fields) onto the original Holly Lane. At footpath sign turn left down the slope to a bridge and up and over the field. As you exit into the field you may walk through corn used as cover for the pheasants.

Head across the field, past the tree in the middle and up to the trees at the far side, where you follow the path through the wood and into the next field. Go over the stile at the far side, cross the road and follow the path up through the trees. When you come out at the top, cross the green, past the pond and take the path between the houses. This is the City Path at The Slade.

Cross the road at the end of the path onto Bucklebury Common, over the bridge and up Chapel Hill, past Blind John's Well and over the common. Keep in roughly a straight line following the signs to the large car park on Fanny's Lane. Cross the road and, again keeping almost a straight line, follow the path to a main lane. Turn right here, cross the road, follow the footpath opposite and then turn left onto Broad Lane and back past Peaches Stores and Garage to the start.

Pang & Kennet Valley Countryside Projects

As you may have heard, the *Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group* (FWAG) went into administration recently, resulting in the closure of all of its 29 offices across the UK, including the one based at Engelfield with whose officers we have worked very closely over the last 20 years. However, whilst this is a significant disappointment, especially for the five people previously employed there, the Friends of the Pang, Kennet and Lambourn Valleys intend to continue our work with local landowners, farmers, Parish Councils, etc. to help them to manage the countryside in an environmentallyfriendly fashion. We have the resources, the skills and

The volunteers work steadily through the winter keeping up appearances!
