Bucklebury Parish Chairman's Letter

During the pandemic we, as a Council, have become much more aware that some in our community experience difficulty in obtaining the necessities of life, for example food shopping, medical prescriptions etc and need help. We are also conscious of some suffering social isolation and have seen our monthly coffee mornings help to address this. Another initiative, important for wellbeing, has been to provide access to an area for outdoor rest and recreation in the small meadow near the Cottage Inn. We are considering a small orchard in this area and improving the access from Morton's Lane for pushchair and wheelchair users. Wildflowers will be planted at another such area, the Hockett Field.

Another Parish Council asset is the popular Playpark and BMX cycle track at the Memorial Hall. Despite problems with littering and occasional vandalism we are determined to invest in upgrading the playpark's attractions and maintaining the condition of the cycle track.

Work on the refurbishment of the Victory Room was recently completed. If you have not already done so I urge you to go and see the first rate job that has been done on turning this 100 year old village hall into a 21st century facility. Financial support for this endeavour has come from, amongst others, the Greenham Trust. We are pleased to have Chris Boulton, the CEO of the Trust, as the guest speaker at our Annual Assembly on 5th May.

As many will be aware the issue of the next stage in the Local Plan consultation process has been delayed until the summer. Following the public meeting she held last August, Laura Farris MP has written to West Berkshire Council giving her views and expressing her concerns over the proposed development of 2500 houses in NE Thatcham. Last month she met with the Leader of WBC and our Ward Member,

Graham Pask, to discuss the matter. There have been changes amongst the senior WBC officers having responsibility for planning, resulting in a fresh perspective and reappraisal of the draft Local Plan. In addition there are signs Central Government will adopt a more flexible stance to the future housing numbers required in West Berkshire. These are all positive indicators in our fight against this proposed development but are no reason for us to lower our guard. While Thatcham Town Council lead on the traffic implications in the area of these thousands of new houses we are engaged on the environmental impact and are using the delay in the Local Plan process productively.

Looking ahead we have The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations in early June with events planned by several communities in the Parish. The Farm Park is also planning events over the long weekend; further information on this will come out shortly.

Parish Council Matters Arising

The Bike Track

Fact: it would be cheaper for the Parish Council to have the bike track removed and the area returned to a field, than the cost of maintenance during the last three years. Maintenance doesn't need to be this expensive if everyone is considerate and abides by the rules.

The bike track has unfortunately been closed again. An electric bike, not allowed on the track, tore up the surface leaving deep ruts that would have been very dangerous for a wheel to be

caught in. Our contractor was able to come quickly and repair the track but the new surface needs rain then dry weather before use.

When the track is closed the signage is very clear for those who can read, and for anyone who can't then the tape across the track surely is clear enough. There are a few people who feel that they can break the rules and ruin things for everyone else by extending the time the track has to remain closed. On the Monday the track was re-surfaced, during afternoon school time, someone with small feet and a bike was on the track presumably with a parent or carer, damaging the track. This took extra time and work to repair. For the rest of the week everyone stayed off but after the rain on the Saturday night and before it had a chance to dry, someone ripped the tape and cycled on the track making ruts in the soft surface. This resulted in the track needing to be kept closed for longer.

Thank you to those of you who stayed off even when you were very keen to cycle on the track.

The other problem at the track is shortcuts – crossing the grass between parts of the track. These degrade the surface until they look like alternative routes and so become even more used. We have had these re-turfed and re-seeded several times. The barriers are there to allow the seed to grow / turf to take / grass to regrow. The problem with shortcuts is that you end up going in the wrong direction. RoSPA (Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents) inspects the playpark and the bike track annually and one of the main issues is shortcuts. Please allow the grass to grow and do not make any or ride on shortcuts.

We hope that users enjoy the track but don't cause any more closures.

Bucklebury Conservation Area Appraisal Consultation

The small team working on this project is now producing a revised draft final report. It has been a long drawn out project for various reasons (not least the pandemic) but is now nearing completion. As always, the focus has been on describing the characteristics that make the conservation area special and how its particular merits can be retained for generations to come. For those new to the area, the small conservation area surrounds St Mary's church in the old village.

This draft report will be sent to the Chief Conservation Officer at West Berkshire Council who will circulate it to key colleagues in the council for comments. As it is a parish council led appraisal, the report will also be circulated to parish councillors for feedback.

Following this, it will be put out for wider public consultation. This will include residents in the conservation area and nearby householders, as well as all Bucklebury parishioners. A copy will be posted on the parish website, www.buckleburyparish.org, and a hard copy will be placed in St Mary's church, so look out for these. All being well, they should be available in March/April. An advert must be placed in the NWN with 6 weeks given for any reply. Public consultation will also be via SurveyMonkey on the West Berkshire District Council website.

The process of consultation is designed to bring public understanding of the character of the conservation area and encourage public debate about any issues. After this process is finished the document will be adopted by WBC and will be a useful aid to planning decisions and appeals as well as an interesting document in its own right.

Blossom into Spring

As part of their Blossom into Spring project, to remember those who have died as a result of Covid-19, West Berkshire Council donated three Great White Cherries (*Prunus Tai Haku*) to the parish, as they did to all parishes in the district. They are of a good size, about 3 metres tall and have been planted on the north side of the recreation ground in the village. Several volunteers, including our district councillor, Graham Pask, set to one sunny afternoon in mid December and planted and staked them. We have a watering regime in place and look forward to their beautiful pure white scented blossom in April/May.

The 'Tai Haku' cherry originates in Japan where it was grown for centuries and was the subject of many paintings. However it became extinct there and it was only in the 1920s, when a single specimen was discovered in a Kent garden by Collingwood Ingram, that it could be propagated again. He sent shoots to Japan, poked into potatoes to keep them damp, via the Trans-Siberian railway and soon they were growing again in Japan. All the great White Cherries in the world originate from this chance seedling. It is a beautiful tree, and hopefully the three trees will enhance the recreation ground for years to come.

Planning

BPC's comments are generally based on planning policy, however, sometimes BPC may place higher importance on one policy than the Planning Officer, resulting in either no objection/refusal or object/approved.

Recycling

DO YOU RECYCLE..... ?

Clean Plastic Bottle Tops. There are several points in Bucklebury Parish where clean, please clean, plastic bottle tops may be deposited: The Memorial Hall – large black bin by the front doors; Memorial Hall kitchen – small green bin on the window sill; Memorial Hall The Oaks kitchen – small green bin on the window sill; Bucklebury Primary School – small green bin in the lobby; The Victory Room – large black bin in the old entrance porch (facing the road); and The Telephone Box library at Chapel Row – small green bin.

Thank you to the wonderful people who empty the small green bins from the Memorial Hall kitchens into the black bin. It is appreciated and noted! Also thanks to Mrs. Kerry Gaumont who collects the plastic bottle tops from Bucklebury Primary School.

The clean plastic bottle tops are sorted into different grades (shown by a triangle with a number inside the triangle). Each grade is put into a different bag and taken to the recycling company Rubber & Plastics Collection Services Ltd. based in Cold Ash. Often lacking plastic grades are plastic tops for make-up, shower gel, toothpaste and spray nozzles, these are taken to Jana Little in Thatcham who collects for Terracycle. As previously mentioned any tops without grades which cannot go to RPCS and Terracycle are taken to the Veolia container in

the Waitrose car park in Thatcham (hopefully recycled or used for much needed power generation).

The army of sorters (Monstrous Regiment?) have now achieved a weight of : **154.2 Kgs** of bottle tops – with more to go! I know it is a drop in the ocean in the grand scheme of recycling, but it is OUR drop, we ARE doing something to make a difference, and a huge thank you to all of you who so assiduously clean and deposit your plastic bottle tops for recycling.

The Trustees of The Memorial Hall have received £130.00 from the Clothing Warehouse so far for items that have been deposited by people in the parish. Although this may not seem a great deal, when you think that most people take items for recycling to a Charity Shop and do not expect to receive any recompense it is a good step forward for monies towards a community project or a local Bucklebury charity.

The drop off point is a large green bin in the Memorial Hall car park on the right hand side of the hall as you drive in. It is good to know that not only are clothes and shoes being either sold and helping a business, or are being given away to people in need – and have you really missed anything you have deposited?!

Defibrillators

In Bucklebury, we have three defibrillators which are available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to any member of the public who may need one. They are located:

- On the right-hand side of Peaches stores, Broad Lane, Upper Bucklebury
- In front of the Victory Room, Bucklebury Village
- To the left-hand side of the front door of the Blade Bone at Chapel Row.

Each of the defibrillators is kept in a locked cabinet. The code to unlock the cabinet is C195; this is clearly labelled on the front of the cabinet.

No training is needed in order to operate the defibrillators. If you think you may need to use one, phone 999; the call handler will tell you where you can get a defibrillator from and give you instructions.

The defibrillators are all registered on “The Circuit” database which is used by the Ambulance call handlers to identify your nearest defibrillator. Each one has a number of guardians who check them on a regular basis, to ensure that everything is in order.

BPC (with the support of Bucklebury Tennis Club) is currently in the process of sourcing a fourth defibrillator to be installed somewhere on the outside of the Memorial Hall. In the next edition of The Oaks there will be details of exactly where it is located at the site.

Training courses on basic Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) are being organised. If you are interested in attending such a session, please email the clerk with your name and contact details (clerk@buckleburyparish.org).

Changes in the Highway Code

The aim of the Highway Code is to promote safety on the road, whilst also supporting a healthy, sustainable and efficient transport system.

New hierarchy of road users. Road-goers will be ranked according to how vulnerable they would be in the event of an accident. H rules clarify this concept: Rule H1 : it is important that all road users are aware of the Highway Code, are considerate to other road users and understand their responsibility for the safety of others. But those in charge of vehicles that can cause the greatest harm in the event of a collision bear the greatest responsibility to take care and reduce the danger they pose to others. This principle applies most strongly to drivers of large goods and passenger vehicles, vans/minibuses, cars/taxis and motorcycles. Cyclists, and horse riders and drivers of horse drawn vehicles likewise have a responsibility to reduce danger to pedestrians. None of this detracts from the responsibility of ALL road users, including pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders, to have regard for their own and other road users' safety. People you encounter may have impaired sight, hearing or mobility and this may not be obvious. So cyclists must watch out for pedestrians, cars need to be careful of cyclists, and heavy goods vehicles need to be wary of everyone.

Previously, vehicles had priority at a junction. Rule H2 : From now on if drivers are turning into a junction and a pedestrian is waiting to cross the road, it's the vehicle that has to give way. The same now applies for pedestrians waiting at zebra crossings, as well as pedestrians and cyclists waiting at parallel crossings. Also the code states that as a driver you should not cut across cyclists, horse riders or horse drawn vehicles going ahead when you are turning into or out of a junction or changing direction or lane. This rule applies regardless of whether cyclists are using a cycle lane, a cycle track, or riding ahead on the road, you should stop and wait for a safe gap in the flow of cyclists if necessary. Cyclists may ride in the centre of a lane to make themselves more visible on quiet roads or streets (before moving left to let faster vehicles overtake when needed), in slow moving traffic, again moving left when the flow picks up again; and when approaching junctions or road narrowings, where overtaking might be unsafe. Cyclists are advised to keep at least half a metre away from the kerb, and drivers must leave at least 1.5metres of space at speeds up to 30mph, faster and more room is needed. 'Dutch Reach' (no, I had never heard of it either – maybe younger drivers have) is the practice of opening a car door with the hand furthest away from said door. This forces you to turn your head and look backwards, which might help you spot an oncoming cyclist or motorcyclist and prevent a nasty accident. Cyclists are reminded that only pedestrians (including those using

wheelchairs and mobility scooters) can use the pavement. Pedestrians are allowed to use cycle tracks, unless there is a road sign prohibiting them.

The Highway Code states: some rules include 'must' or 'must not' these rules are supported by existing laws. Those rules that include 'should' or 'should not' are only guidance and not supported by existing laws.

WBC Councillor's Report

Wishing everyone a Happy and Healthy 2022!

This is a good time for me to update everyone on what I am doing "behind the scenes" to represent your views on the NE Thatcham proposals which are part of the Local Plan update. Following the very well attended meeting organised by Laura Farris in the Memorial Hall last August she had a meeting with Michael Gove to share our views and to seek a way forward, especially in looking to see if there was any flexibility in the number of new houses we were expected to take in West Berkshire.

We are continuing our work together and in early January I met with Laura and the Council Leader Lynne Doherty together with Eric Owens, who is our new Executive Director of Planning, to see what progress can be made ahead of the next consultation likely to be held in the summer/autumn. Eric has been in post for around four months and has been joined by Viv Evans as the interim Service Lead for Planning. Viv has extensive experience in senior roles such as Head of Planning, Director and Chief Executive in a number of Councils and is a welcome addition to our planning team. These two experienced Officers have said they will review all options with a new "set of eyes" including overall housing numbers and alternative sites. Our discussions have been positive and I will continue to keep everyone updated when I can. I report regularly to the

Parish Council especially Barry Dickens and Peter Spours and am happy to discuss whatever I can with anyone who contacts me personally.

By now you will have heard that our bin and recycling collection days have been changed to Fridays for all of our parish starting on 11th February for recycling and 18th February for rubbish collection. For many years we have had these collections on the same day of the week apart from changes following Bank Holidays, and I understand that no one likes these days to be changed. Over the years the collection routes have had new houses added on so the routes the crews take have become more scattered which is hardly efficient! Veolia are adding two new vehicles and crews to the collection fleet so we can expect the very reliable service we receive to become even better with the occasional non-collection of green bins to be minimised. I am sure we will soon remember to put our bins out on a Thursday evening!

Continuing on the subject of waste and recycling WBC is now asking you to register your car (up to three cars per household) to access the Household Recycling Centres, the process is simple in that when you attempt to book a visit on line you will be asked to enter your car number plate(s) which will be picked up by the ANPR cameras as you drive in. If you don't wish to do this online then phone the Council (01635 551111), go through to the waste team who will help and also make the booking for you. This system will save money on printing and posting permits!

I have written at length before about Traffic Regulation Orders on our byways and won't repeat this but may I remind everyone to phone the police if they see or hear any illegal activity. Thank you to the residents of The Slade who did this over the Christmas break, they received a good and positive response!

Finally and nothing at all to do with the Council (for once!!) changes to the Highway Code are coming in at the end of January primarily giving pedestrians and cyclists more priority at road junctions but also banning touching mobile phones and parking on pavements amongst some other changes.

As always please contact me on any WBC issues I can help with.

Donnington Hospital Trust— A Brief History

You may not know that located next to the Surgery at Chapel Row is Donnington Close, a supported residence owned and managed by the Donnington Hospital Trust. The Charity was founded in 1393 by Sir Richard Abberbury originally to provide shelter for twelve elderly men and a minister, in his manor of Donnington, Newbury. During the centuries the fortunes of the Hospital have followed those of its various Patrons and of course national events. Neglected in the 16th Century it was refounded in the reign of Elizabeth 1, only to be completely destroyed in the Civil War when it was engulfed by the siege of Donnington Castle.

Frances, Lady Bolingbroke left the Manor of Bucklebury in her Will to her sister Mary Winchcombe, who in 1699 married Robert Packer, Lord of the Manor of Donnington. Robert and Mary had five children but only one grandchild, Elizabeth who married David Hartley the Philosopher. To this day the Trust continues to be overseen by the Hartley Russell family, Willie being the current Patron.

A remarkable history of care in our community, Donnington Close is one of six Almshouse complexes managed by the Trust which provides 72 residences in Oxfordshire and Berkshire.

Bucklebury Community Bus

The week before Christmas, the Trustees were devastated to discover that our much-needed Bucklebury Community Bus had been stolen in the dead of night from the car park of The Cottage Inn. With virtually all businesses and organisations closing until January, we knew we faced a monumental struggle to resume the service without a bus. We took the regretful but necessary decision to suspend the service and provide parents with the maximum time to make alternative arrangements.

Despite already welcoming visitors for the holidays the Trustees broke away from family commitments to attend a series of virtual meetings. We reported the theft, gathered as much background information as possible, submitted a claim to the insurers, cancelled the fuel card – and began the search for another bus. With prices rocketing due to the lack of availability of used vehicles, we could not obtain an equivalent vehicle for the same value as our insurance paid out.

The Trustees have always run the bus as a sustainable and long-term facility for the community while keeping the cost to parents as low as possible, with support from Long Lane Garage and Cottage Inn landlord Gary Bush. Virtually every penny charged goes towards paying the driver, maintaining the vehicle and budgeting for the future. Each year we also put aside repayments received from VAT and Gift Aid to go towards a new vehicle which we had not anticipated buying until 2025 at the earliest.

Many phone calls later – and in the first week of January – we secured our new bus, one of the Trustees taking time off work to help inspect and collect. Remarkably we were unable to provide a service for only two days and we are grateful for the understanding of our parents and carers. A great deal of time was also spent taking advice from appropriate professionals on additional measures to avoid a repetition of the theft.

The bus purchase, and the cost of additional security, has significantly depleted our funds, which are under further pressure with the increased cost of fuel and covid safety consumables. We will continue to do our best to provide an affordable, safe and reliable means for parents to transport their children to Kennet School, supported by our very dependable and able driver, Claire.

In November, we joined young people from across the country, and took part in Parliament Week. The girls had a very lively debate about the value of homework and convinced everyone that even if you do not finish your dinner, you should be allowed dessert. The evening ended with a challenge to build the tallest model of 'Big Ben' out of newspaper.

The girls wanted to support a local charity during the term, so in the run up to Christmas we were joined by Rosie from West Berkshire Foodbank to kick off a collection in time for their Christmas deliveries. Rosie talked to the girls about what they knew about the foodbank, busted some myths and got them thinking about what they might be able to collect from home. In total, we collected over 80 meals worth of food, as well as toiletries, cleaning products and sanitary items which we dropped off at the beginning of December.

During December, the girls threw themselves into all things Christmassy. We had our first session in the kitchen, making Christmas fudge and singing along to Christmas tunes. The girls really enjoyed all being able to cook in there together, it even made the washing up fun!

We also held our first sleepover since the renovations. We again took full advantage of the new kitchen, with all of the girls making their own pizzas from scratch. They played games, made pom pom sprouts and got very messy marbling Christmas tree decorations with nail polish. Not a lot of sleep

was had, but it was a great way of introducing some of the younger girls to their first night away with Guides.

We have an exciting term plan for the spring, including starting “Rustle, Bustle and Squeak” a set of nature-based activities and

We were sorry to learn of the death recently of a long standing member of the group, Sheila Kent. Sheila had always been such a very active member in so many aspects of Bucklebury life, including the History Group. Born and brought up in The Slade and raising her family with her husband, Ron, in Bucklebury, she had a detailed and extensive knowledge of the local area. This proved most valuable when she was one of the three editors of "Bucklebury In Focus", the book of historic photos produced to celebrate the Millennium. Having lived here all her life she invariably knew the location of and the identity of the people in the old photos as well as supplying detailed background information for the text.

Having, as a child, attended the Sunday school at the Congregational Chapel on Turner's Green, built to honour her ancestor, the farmer and preacher, John Morton, it became a huge part of her life. Latterly she served as Church Secretary organising services and preaching rotas. The Christmas Carol Services are particularly remembered during the final years of the Chapel's active ministry.

She was a great advocate of herbal medicine and many of her remedies proved very successful. The History Group will miss her very much and we send our sympathies to all her family.

John Morton

Imagine what it must have been like to have been born into a poor family in 1788 and when eight years old, your father dies. Disaster! Mrs Morton moved with her son, John, from Sunninghill to Hope Cottage, in the small hamlet of The Slade, Bucklebury, where they went to live with relatives, Henry Hoare and Sarah Hope, nee Hoare, probably a brother and sister.

John would have found himself in a large parish with a Lord of the Manor and one of the biggest commons in Berkshire. The common provided a livelihood for the 170 families living there who depended on its resources. These were many, including grazing and bracken for bedding their animals, water for their

households, and wood for their fires.

John was fortunate because, in the days long before compulsory state education, the family must have been able to survive without his daily labour. Within walking distance, over the common and down the Harts Hill to the village of Thatcham, there was a Bluecoat School, that is, a charity school, which John attended. In those days only reading, writing, arithmetic and scripture would have been taught, but that was a good education when so many poor children had none and it stood John in good stead. He could not have achieved all he did in his life if he had been illiterate.

One day, the story goes, when he was about 13, on his way with his class mates, up the steep hill home from school he fell ill and they had to carry him home. He had a terrible fever from which he nearly died and when he recovered he was left with a bad limp. Although it was difficult from then on for him to join in the games with his friends, he did his best not to be left out and would join in where he could or go hunting squirrels with them on the common.

On leaving school he started to work on local farms and eventually moved to run Holly Farm.

In those days many people went to church. John and his

mother attended St. Mary's, the parish church of Bucklebury, but at that time nonconformist worship was gaining in popularity and when the newly formed congregational church opened in Thatcham, John found he preferred that. He became a Sunday school teacher and in 1816 started to preach in the open air, travelling round the local villages. Some people who worshipped at the established church did all they could to disrupt his simple sincere preaching and mocked and harassed him, throwing eggs, threatening him with cudgels and pouring derision on his sermons. Undeterred he continued, becoming a good public speaker and he became a familiar figure in the area. He attracted quite a following and his headquarters became a disused blacksmith's shop on Turner's Green, so called because this was the area on the common where the local bowl turners plied their trade.

John married Mary, nee Lyford and they had six children, two boys and four girls. Peter, born 1819, Lydia, born 1822, Mercy, born 1822, Mary born 1824, David, born 1826, Dorcas, born 1828. They all survived into adulthood and married. Some of John's descendants still live in the parish. *(to be continued)*

Hector Newman

Following David Southgate's excellent piece on War Graves in the last issue of The Oaks, we have discovered another war grave in the parish, this time in the Church Yards of St. Mary, Marlston.

Sergeant Hector Raymond Alfred Newman was a wireless operator on Vickers Wellington VIII and was killed on 5th May 1943 when the aircraft he was flying in crashed after stalling on takeoff from Limavady, Northern Ireland.

Royal Air Force Limavady, near Derry in Northern Ireland was the first of over 20 new airfields constructed in Northern Ireland during the war and was handed over to 15 Group. The base was used by Coastal Command in the fight against German U-Boats in the Atlantic Ocean and was home to several RAF Units during WW2 operating large numbers of Whitleys, Hudsons and Wellingtons of 502, 224, 221 Squadrons and 7th (Coastal) Operation Training Unit. The role of the OTU was to train and build together crews for Coastal Command's operational Squadrons, similar to the OTUs in Bomber Command.

It wasn't until we were trying to find out more details of Hector Newman that we found, to our surprise, that he was a cousin of my late father.
