# Bucklebury Parish Chairman's Letter

What's changed since last January?

Well, what hasn't changed were the wonderful Christmas celebrations in the parish, including the carols at the cemetery even though this year we had to contend with rain rather than the more picturesque snow!

We are still waiting for David Wilson Homes to complete the work on the meadows behind the Cottage Inn before the legal work can be completed. Last year I wrote that I thought the transfer would be completed by April. I hope this year it might be!

The 4x4's are still using the River Pang as a playground, destroying the banks, eroding the road verge and causing environmental damage. We have had lots of correspondence with WBC, the environment agency and the police. Fortunately we were at the ford when contractors were clearing out the ditches and we persuaded them to build up the banks by the little ford where the erosion was particularly bad. We are hoping to place posts along the road to help prevent further damage. If you see anyone behaving irresponsibly please take a photo if you can, take registration numbers and alert the police. The damage by 4x4's also continues on the common and it is planned to place CCTV cameras in suitable locations to try to catch the culprits. The Commons Advisory Committee is heavily involved in this.

The traffic around the school at the beginning and end of the school day continues to cause concern. Last term there were two near accidents. The Parish Council is discussing the problems with a very worried parent so hopefully some progress may be made.

The demands on our precept have not changed either so we anticipate another small rise for the next financial year.

#### So, what's new? Anne Hillerton has joined the Parish Council.

She has lived in the parish for many years, taught at Woolhampton Primary School where she was a governor and has been a very supportive and interested member of the community. We now have a record number of four women councillors!

We have grit bins at several new sites in the parish. If you think a grit bin would be an advantage anywhere, please contact the clerk.

It was suggested that the official name of the road between The Blade Bone and Marlston should be investigated. This has been done. No clear conclusion was drawn, so it has been decided to leave things as they are.

Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust (BOWT) have signed an agreement with WBC to take over the management of open spaces in West Berkshire from this January. Bucklebury Common falls into this category. BBOWT will be working closely with the Estate Office and a representative will be on the Common Advisory committee

The West Berkshire Countryside Society will continue to give the parish advice and support and we are extremely lucky to have such a dedicated group of people at our disposal. Last year there were 12 working parties of 15 volunteers working 6 hour days which amounts to about 1000 hours of hard work! On several occasions we asked the society for advice on managing land owned by the parish. This year among other things they will be clearing some of the ponds in the parish.

The parish council are supporting the application by the Tennis Club for additional lighting.

BPC had discussed commemorating the birth of Prince George in some way. After much discussion it was decided that since Mr Hartley Russell is erecting two gate posts on the Common at the east end of The Avenue to commemorate both the wedding of the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge as well as the royal birth that this would suffice.

Moving ahead from a very wet and chilly January day to the spring, Common clearing will be on Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> March. The usual delicious cakes will be provided.

## Parish Council Matters Arising

## Police Liaison Group

While it appears that we are currently enjoying some respite from the wave of anti-social behaviour that swept the parish during 2012-3, unfortunately other forms of crime have replaced it. We have seen a number of thefts from garages and outbuildings, and more recently, a number of vehicle-related thefts. The thefts from outbuildings are sadly endemic in rural communities and are no more prevalent here than in other similar parishes. It is recognised that this is not very reassuring, please be aware of locking outbuildings and ensuring that all items are secured as best they can be – please be vigilant. The police have recently arrested a number of youths in connection with car crime in the wider area, which will hopefully put a stop to these instances. However, again please be vigilant by removing valuables from vehicles and ensuring that anything stored in them is removed from sight.

Thames Valley Police have been highly pro-active in dealing the recent bout of vehicle-related thefts, but without our continued support they can only achieve so much. That support comes mainly in the form of reporting criminal activity, the necessity of which cannot be overly stressed. The Police Liaison Committee continues to monitor the crime situation and aims to mobilise local support as and when appropriate. There have also been a number of recent initiatives instigated, which have ranged from the provision of crime prevention advice at one of the local societies to the provision of a covert, low-light camera by the Parish Council. This camera is to be deployed, in consultation with the police and WBC, around the parish as required to deal with crime. Initial locations are likely to involve those remote areas on and around the Common that are subject to abuse by 4x4s. The police will use any evidence gathered to try and secure prosecutions.

However, all these initiatives are only successful with the continued assistance of parish members. Ultimately we have to provide the police with the tools to do their job, and that basically means providing them with information about crimes that have been or are being committed. PCSO Sarah Preston has explained elsewhere in The Oaks about communicating with the police, but in short, if a crime is actually taking place dial 999, if you have to report a previous crime or have information about one then dial 101 or report online at <u>www.thamesvalley.police.uk/reportonline</u>. Crime Stoppers can be called anonymously on 0800 555111. You should have previously received sticky reminder labels with these

numbers on; if you have not please contact the Parish Clerk. Please do not hesitate to pass any information however trivial it appears to the police.

Criminal activities have not been limited to anti-social behaviour:

- Burglaries are still occurring, so please be vigilant, especially of garages, sheds and oil tanks; though figures for the Bucklebury area are the same as for other rural communities.

- Speeding is still endemic. The Police are very much aware, and police and WBC cameras continue to be deployed.

- Flytipping continues around different parts of the Common. If you see someone fly-tipping then please report details to the police, otherwise report the rubbish to streetcare@westberks.gov.uk or to the Parish Clerk. It will normally be removed within 48 hours. Please remember that you may inadvertently become involved with fly tipping (with an associated fine of up to  $\pounds 5,000$ ) if you give waste to an unlicensed person for disposal. Please be wary.

- Vehicles driving on the Common continue to be an issue. There are a number of sites around the Common where vehicles are being driven illegally. Driving anywhere off-road is illegal, as is driving on footpaths and bridleways, and all need to be reported to the police. Equally, it is illegal to drive on an unrestricted byway without full insurance, tax and MOT, and even with these users need to be considerate to others, not damage the surface and observe road and bylaws. There are a number of circumstances where these requirements are not being met - there is a lot of damage to the banks of the Pang, a track has been established on the Lower Common and there are the usual areas of 'mud plugging' (churning up tracks). The police cannot be in every location all the time, so if you see vehicles on the common either off the byways or causing damage to the surface, please do not hesitate to contact the police. Your report will help build the intelligence as to usage that will allow the police to be pro-active in catching law-breakers. All parties involved are committed to eradicating illegal use of the common, so please report any vehicles that are not driving on byways, are damaging the surface or being driven in a dangerous or inconsiderate manner. Photos and/or registrations are obviously beneficial. In a similar manner, the Hockett Field is privately owned and not to be used for motor cycles - if your children are doing this please stop them.

In summary, if we wish the Police to be able to do their job, we must continue to report instances as we are aware of them, whether this is burglary or anti-social behaviour or 4x4s on the Common.

### Broadband for Bucklebury

In the twenty-first century, none of our rural communities in West Berkshire, or indeed the country at large, should be neglected when it comes to a superfast broadband network. The roll-out, which will see 100 per cent of properties in Bucklebury receive basic broadband (2mbit/s) and 68 per cent receive superfast coverage (24mbit/s), is due to be completed by September 2015.

I am certain that all readers of *The Oaks* will agree that a superfast network will serve as the foundation for new economic dynamism, creating hundreds of thousands of jobs and adding billions to our GDP. Access to the internet is fundamental for business and education and this will only intensify as Britain continues to compete in the global race. This is in my opinion, the single most important thing we can do to ensure the sustainability of our rural communities and to end the digital divide.

Last month, I and West Berkshire Council Leader, Gordon Lundie, met with Ed Vaizey, the Minister responsible for the  $f_{1.5}$  billion roll-out. I conveyed my disappointment that not all households will benefit from a superfast connection. I and the Council are continuing to push the government, so that all premises will be covered.

### WBC Councillors' Report

West Berkshire Council has just completed lengthy negotiations with the Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust (BBOWT) to form a partnership to manage the Council's countryside assets including Bucklebury Common and the Nature Discovery Centre in Thatcham. Ownership of the Common still remains with the Bucklebury Estate and the Common Advisory Committee will still meet to coordinate and advise on the works that are carried out on the Common. The ranger service will be run by BBOWT and I would not expect you to notice many changes in the way in which the Common is managed, the main advantage to working with BBOWT is that they are able to access different grants and other funding which the Council is unable to do which will make a big difference to the various projects we run over the next ten years.

With spring just around the corner I am sure many produce more green waste than fits into the green bin so just a reminder that the recycling facility at Padworth is open from 12.30 until 6pm Monday to Friday and 8am until 6pm on Saturday and Sunday for most items (main exclusions are general household waste, furniture and asbestos/plasterboard) and is so much quicker and more convenient than going all the way to the Newtown Road site in Newbury. I have never found much of a queue there either so don't tell too many people!

As reported elsewhere in this edition of The Oaks there was, sadly, another spate of vandalism and criminal damage to property and vehicles over the festive season. The police have been quick to respond and have made a number of arrests but it is important to remain vigilant and, apologies for stating the obvious, do make sure that all valuable items are removed from cars and vans overnight. It is essential to phone the police on 999 if you see a crime being committed or 101 if you have to report anything less urgent to the police. To reassure everyone the police are very aware of what has been happening and Bucklebury is very much on their "radar" with the number of patrols increased routinely.

## Bucklebury CofE School

Most readers will know of Bucklebury Primary School, that provides quality education to around 120 children between 4 and 11 years of age, thanks to the dedicated efforts of teachers and support staff. However you may not be aware that the strategic direction for the school is provided by governors; unpaid volunteers who are accountable to the children, parents, staff and the Local Authority. The school is looking for a governor from our local community to join us, but as this is an unpaid role that requires about four hours work per week, you might ask yourself why anyone would volunteer.

It is often said that "children are our future". The prosperity of this country is affected by the skills of people as they join the workforce. Research clearly shows that children who are below Government targets when they leave primary school are quite likely to leave secondary school with poor results. They are less likely to get jobs than children who exceeded these targets, and indeed a substantially higher percentage of children with below average primary age results will end up in prison compared to children who obtained average or higher results.

The reason we become governors is because the work we do today, for primary age children, will have an impact on their whole lives. We don't get a financial reward for what we do, but if we fulfil our roles well, we receive considerable satisfaction from knowing that we are improving life chances for local children. What better reward could there be?

# Memories of Old Bucklebury Harry Copas

### Part Three

A .W..Sutton, of the famous seed firm, which used to be in Reading, had Bucklebury Place built and being a very generous and kind man he did a lot for the people of the parish. He formed a club whereby people could buy their seeds cheaply, he also had a nice clubroom built and supplied it with a couple of billiard tables and many other games, and it was called the 'fireside club'. As the family of Suttons were very religious, they spent some of their time abroad searching for new plants and combining it with missionary work.

Mr Sutton used to invite us children up to his place and show us his pictures on screen, shown by what they called a 'magic lantern' (no videos in those days). We used to be thrilled watching the many places he had visited. We used to walk up from The Slade with an adult in charge of us. Another good thing Mr Sutton used to do was invite a lot of poor boys from Reading to camp in the Hocket Field during the school summer holidays and they had the run of the common and the lovely clean fresh air – such a change from the town, and they all enjoyed it very much. Mr Sutton was a real Christian gentleman.

Sadly Suttons lost a lot of money in the Great War, so they say, and they sold the estate to Dr Carl Langer, an Austrian, who was head of the renowned business The Mono Nickel Company in South Wales, which later merged to form the giant I.C.I.

Just about the same time as Bucklebury Place was built, Mr George Palmer had Marlston House built, both before the turn of the century. Mr Palmer was head of the famous biscuit firm in Reading. He was another good Christian man and he also had a club room built on the Hermitage Road, which they called the Speedwell, where all his workers could come and convalesce after sickness, it's now turned into flats.

In my lifetime as a bricklayer I have, with several old craftsmen, helped build these large houses and one of the old brickies told me that when they were building Marlston House they placed every coin of the realm in circulation at that time under one of the large stones in the building.

At my age and having worked with these old men, I can go back over 100 years, at which time they told me the wage was 3d per hour.

In 1911, which was a hot dry summer, there was a disastrous fire on the common at Upper Bucklebury. I was taken up to see it, acres was burning and at that time it was covered in heather and gorse with quite a good layer of peat underneath so it spread through the peat and sprung up further on and I was so amazed to see the wool of some sheep alight. It seemed to break up underneath them as they lay down. Another animal that helped spread it along was the rabbit – they were terrified so they stayed in the bushes till their fur was on fire then dashed to some more bushes and set them on fire. All the fields on the south side were all burnt as well, right up to Tomlin's Farm. It was so bad that the Lady of the Manor, Mrs Webly Parry, put a few men on night duty to see that it didn't get out of control, but still it kept going and, complaining to someone one day, they replied 'well if you stopped supplying the beer it might stop' and after she did that it burn out. You can draw your own conclusions about that.

In my younger days there were plenty of deliverymen. We had the choice of 3 or 4 bakers and grocers. There were also two different firms calling to pick up boots for repair or to supply new ones. We even had a man to deliver paraffin from Zin Zan – he also sold some other domestic goods. He kept a little shop in Zin Zan so he used to bring sweets to sell as well a hardboiled sweet called bulls eyes. I used to think 'what a mixture carried with paraffin'.

There wasn't much call for butchers as most cottagers fatted and killed their own pigs and salted the flitches. Quite a lot of the cottages had a bacon rack suspended on the ceiling and what with the pipe smoke I must have been smoked and salted! The slats in the bacon rack were shaped (like triangles on piece of wood) so the least amount of wood was in contact with the bacon. The man who used to come round killing the pigs was Butcher Green who always walked everywhere. I can picture him now with his knives and a big steel hung on his belt. As the rule was only to kill pigs when there was an R in the month in the summer months he used to go sheep-shearing. After we had killed the pig it had to have all the hair and bristles removed, which was done by rolling the pig over in a small fire, which was burning straw or bracken. But if we used bracken it had to be dry and cut standing as, if it had come out of the rick, it wouldn't burn fast enough. One good thing about having our own pigs killed was the lovely home cured lard - we used to reckon 1lb per score of pig, it was the real machoy (sic). My mother, who was Welsh, soon learned to make lovely lard cakes - they used to have sugar sprinkled over them. I haven't tasted anything like it since. No wonder they used to say Berkshire was famous for wheat and lard cakes. Quite a few children in my time used to go to school with a sandwich of lard sprinkled with sugar - it was very popular. We used to call the cake 'Lardy Clangers'.

Another old craft, which seems to be gone, was what they called stripping. I remember it as a boy. When they felled oak trees in the autumn and after all the boughs were cut off these, old chaps used to strip all the bark off the boughs and it would then go to the tannery in Stanford Dingley. It was on the left side of the village going from Bucklebury. Of course they all walked to wherever the trees were and they would come home carrying one of the smaller boughs on their shoulder, they called it a shoulder stick (Some stick). They had a shorter stick on the other shoulder and it went behind their neck and under the bigger bough so the weight was on both shoulders.

Quite a lot of us in my young days kept goats for milking as there were no milk deliveries in those days. We kept goats but people had to go to the nearest farm for their milk. Sometime in the 1920s when they started to produce milk bottles some of the farmers started delivering milk, which was a good thing.

There were several undertakers in the parish, but one that stands out in my mind as the late W. Herman, an undertaker who claimed he had buried 9 undertakers in his lifetime, that seems to be a record.

### Bucklebury Heathland

The prospects for 2014 for the heather on the Commons look promising.

We weed wiped 8 acres on the lower common in August to kill silver birch. A party of 24 students from Reading worked hard clearing 6 acres of 4 foot scots pine on the lower common. If it ever stops raining a contractor will "swipe" 6 acres on the lower common. The volunteers have continued to chip away at cutting silver birch and treating the stumps with round up.

A problem we have not encountered before is a bad attack of "heather beetle", the beetles eat the leaves of the plant turning it brown, looking dead! Attacks have been widespread in the south and occur from time to time, so we are hoping they do not appear next spring.

A contractor is starting work soon to reclear 3 acres of silver birch scrub on the Upper Common adjacent to the area cleared 5 years ago. At the same time they will "cut and clear" the remaining gorse which has taken over the northern end we cleared before.

We still have two work days this winter: Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> February Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> March Do come and join us 10.30am at Angels Corner

### West Berkshire Countryside Society

Recently the Parish Council were discussing the donation to the West Berkshire Countryside Society and as a result asked Dick Greenaway (the Chairman) to write a short paper. The Parish Council thought you would be interested in the result....



#### West Berkshire Countryside Society: Advantages to Bucklebury Parish.

West Berkshire Countryside Society's (WBCS) constitution states:

West Berkshire The Society exists to promote the understanding, Countryside Society appreciation and conservation of the West Berkshire Countryside by its residents and visitors and all other groups and businesses involved in its care and management. The Society will also promote practical work to further these aims within West Berkshire.

The Society shall be a not-for-profit body.'

Bucklebury Parish (BP), being one of the largest parishs in Berkshire and having one of the largest Rights of Way networks in England plus having very large areas of heathland and woodland freely accessible to the public – naturally and rightly derives a larger share of benefit than most other parishes from the Society's activities.

The activities of the Bucklebury Heathland Conservation Group (BHCG) - part of WBCS - have recovered a large area of Bucklebury Common from dense self-sown birch and Scots pine. The Common is one of the largest areas of Lowland Heath in southern England and as such is a nationally important area as well as being a very valuable source of open air recreation to parishioners and the general public. BHCG's work keeps the scrub at bay and as a result the Common is rich in heathland plants, birds and animals – such as woodlarks, nightjars, glow-worms, reptiles, heather, cross-leaved heath and many others. There were seven working parties during 2013 – each of about 6 hours and staffed by about 15 volunteers amounting to over 600 hours of hard work. Similar working parties have cleared archaeological features to make them visible to walkers.

Bucklebury Parish has a very extensive Rights of Way network. Technically the care of these falls to the Highways Department of West Berkshire Council. Severe reduction in staffing has meant that many paths have been kept open by WBCS Conservation Volunteers and kindred groups such as the Ramblers. This is going to be even more necessary in the future.

To introduce the area to its parishioners guided walks have been lead by local experts. To encourage walkers to repeat the walks and to explore by themselves, walk leaflets have been written and printed and freely distributed by WBCS walk leaders.

The Parish Council has on several occasions recently asked WBCS for technical advice on matters to do with managing the Hockett Field and other land owned by the parish. This has been freely given and has resulted in WBCS Conservation Volunteer working parties of up to 14 people working on the hedges and other features on five occasions. This amounts to over 400 hours of hard voluntary work.

Ponds are a nationally declining habitat. WBCS Conservation Teams will be working on a number of these during the coming year.

The River Pang flows along the northern edge of the parish. It is a chalk stream and therefore one of only about 200 in the world. Chalk streams are fed by springs from the groundwater rather than by run-off from the surface. As a result their water is clean, filtered and chemically rich supporting a wide range of plants, fish and animals. England has 85% of the world's chalk streams and therefore has a duty of care to look after this rare habitat. WBCS is supporting West Berkshire Farming & Countryside Project that has recently launched a major campaign to improve the condition of the river. We will be supporting the project both financially and with the work of our Conservation Volunteer teams.

Barn Owls are a feature of Bucklebury's night skies. For many years Barn Owl Conservation teams have been erecting and monitoring barn owl nest boxes all over West Berkshire – not only in Bucklebury Parish. In 2012 this resulted in 72 successfully reared young owls. The weather during 2013 was so bad that not a single chick survived. The teams will be working hard during 2014 to recover this loss. Each nest box costs about  $f_{2}$ 70.

WBCS has also been able to help Bucklebury landowners with technical advice on environmental matters and with woodland archaeology thereby helping them to manage their land in a more environmentally sensitive manner.

WBCS derives its income from the membership fees of its members, from sales of publications and from donations from parish councils and landowners who support our ideals and who have benefited from our work. We have no permanent paid staff and no premises. All our officers are volunteers working from their own homes.

Our financial resources are spent on providing professional training for our volunteers and on providing them with tools and other equipment and with specialist items such as barn owl nest boxes. Insurance is another major expense. With larger teams and a wider range of activities this expense can only grow.

Our 'motto' is 'We care for <u>your</u> countryside'. This we do to the utmost of our ability because it is <u>our</u> countryside too and we love and value it as much as we hope you do. Bucklebury Parish Council's donation has always been larger than that of other smaller parishes reflecting the size of its population and the size of its need. We sincerely hope you will feel able to continue your donation.

## Walk-Workhouse Green

Turn left from the Memorial Hall Car Park in Upper Bucklebury, cross the road and take the footpath on the right before The Cottage Inn. Cross the fields and at Byles Green bear right towards the road. Turn right onto the road and take the first footpath on the left. Follow this in almost a straight line *(it takes you behind the cemetery)* to a wide track – turn left and take the path beside the bungalow, which will be on your right.

This is known as Workhouse Green *(if anyone can give me more information on this area then I would be very grateful)* – turn right at Sadgrove Farm and take the next footpath on your left, over a bridge and across the fields. There is a footpath on your right – quite well hidden – as you reach the far side of the fields, take this path over another bridge and you will see footpath signs almost straight across the field.

Take the path, which leads though the trees (straight on) to a gate and then turn right up the hill, past Bucklebury Farm Park on your left. Turn left, keeping BFP on your left, at the cross paths and at the end bear right and then take the left hand path. (Vanners barn used to stand at this junction prior to being burnt down) Follow this path past The Coronation Oak on your left, straight over at the cross paths and then turn right at the T junction to get back to the main track. Turn left, past Osgood's Gully on your right and on to Angel's Corner. Keeping the fence on your right cross the car park and take the narrow road, 'quiet lane', past the cemetery, cross the next road and take the track on your left, which will lead you back to the main road and The Memorial Hall.
