Bucklebury Parish Chairman's Letter

After an amazing summer for weather, we look forward to the coming months.

Councillor John Brims, throughout the road works for the new water main up the Hart's Hill, has, on behalf of BPC, kept up a dialogue with Thames Water. This has been very time consuming and at times frustrating, but hopefully has kept them on their toes and here we are with the road re-opened, much to everybody's relief!

You will recall that grit bins are now the responsibility of BPC. Councillor Tim Slatford has checked all those in the parish and they will be refilled in time for the winter weather. It has also been decided to put an extra bin on the Briff Lane/Turners Green junction. If you notice any problems with the bins during the winter, or if the grit is running low, please inform the Clerk. Please also remember the grit is only for the public roads, not our own drives. It is expensive stuff!

The autumn common and parish clearing is on Oct. 13th. We hope as many people turn up as last time. We will make sure there are enough cakes!

The TROs on some of the byways will be reinstated this winter to protect them from misuse by 4x4s. The usual plea; if you see illegal activity on the common, please report it to the police and take number plates if possible, so the owners can be traced and prosecuted.

To preserve the River Pang from misuse by vehicles driving along its bed and destroying the wildlife, 3 wooden posts have been sunk upstream near the big ford. BPC are also in discussion with the Environment Agency about further preventative measures. Councillors Lindy Clarke and Robin Rankin are pursuing this.

Two of the oak trees on the meadows planted by David Wilson Homes, to replace those illegally felled, have not thrived. These will be replaced by others grown and donated by parishioners, this autumn. Richard Hubbard has very kindly offered to do the work.

The Bucklebury air raid siren, after a nomadic life following the end of WW2 finally returned to its war time home in St. Mary's church tower. However it was felt that this was not a suitable permanent home and the WW2 museum at Welford was approached by John Tennent, since Newbury Museum already have one. The museum will be delighted to have it in their collection and so it will be donated


to them on permanent loan.

Bucklebury Cemetery



Councillor David Southgate has done a magnificent job of repairing and restoring the bench to the rear of the chapel and it now looks as good as new.

Work will begin on the remaining woodland to the east of the 1970's cemetery this autumn, clearing the brush and spindly trees, but leaving the mature ones. We hope this will enhance this part

of the cemetery, keeping its rural aspect, but hopefully looking tidier.

At the same time, graves that have subsided will be filled in. This should be the responsibility of the individual families, but it was decided that in the interests of safety, the cost would be borne by the parish.

Sadly, the large oak cross erected when the cemetery was extended in the 1970's, succumbed to fungus and rot. Experts were called in, but unfortunately it could not be saved. It was not felt that the cost of replacing it could be justified. The burial Board proposed that the site would be an excellent place for a seat and BPC agreed. It was decided to use a reconstituted plastic one similar to those overlooking the tennis courts at the Memorial hall, in the hope that it will be more durable than a tradition wooden one.

Cemetery Carols by Candlelight will be held on Monday 17th Dec. 6pm-7pm. We can't promise the magic snow lends to the occasion, but we can promise a great atmosphere, delicious mulled wine and mince pies; hopefully we will see you there.

Rights of Way


There is a proposal to bring legislation into force that will extinguish public footpaths and bridleways that existed before 1949 if they are not recorded on the Definitive Map by 2026.

This might mean that a route which people use, or have used, but which is not recorded, might be under threat of extinguishment after 2026.

In order for routes to be recorded, evidence must be available from members of the public at large who have walked the route, uninterrupted for 20 years or more as a right (this means that they have not had express permission of the land owner or walked the route in secrecy).

Your Parish Council needs your assistance to ensure that any routes not yet recorded are identified so they can put these routes forward to West Berkshire Council for assessment. If you identify a route that you believe still needs recording, please contact the Clerk.

West Berkshire Energy Switch

See if you can pay less for your energy bills by signing up to the West Berkshire Energy Switch

The West Berkshire Energy Switch is a free to join scheme which gives residents the chance to see if they can make savings on their fuel bills.

Auctions are held each year in February, May and October. Since 2016, over 450 households have switched supplier through the scheme, saving nearly £110,000 between them. The recent May 18 auction saw switchers saving an average of £184 on their annual bill.

A one day reverse auction will be held on the 9th October, suppliers compete with their best offers, and the winning supplier/s then send registrants their personalised offer for consideration.

There is no obligation to switch. Sign up and see if you can save; to register or find out more, visit www.westberks.gov.uk/communityswitch

You will need to have your latest energy bill to hand, as you'll need the details during the registration process.

Registration is open until 27th November 2018, and offers will begin to go out from 22nd October. The sooner you sign up, the sooner you can see if you can save.

West Berkshire residents without internet access should contact West Berkshire Council on 01635 503267 by 16th November to register. Remember to have your energy bill or annual statement to hand when you call.

WBC Councillors' Report

Following the best summer for many years some plants have struggled to grow and others have thrived, particularly hedges! As we are now well into garden clear-up time we thought a reminder about the changes to our recycling sites would be helpful.

Our nearest recycling centre is at Padworth and is much more pleasant to use than the Newtown Road site in Newbury as it is always less crowded. You can now take general household waste there following a change in the planning permission earlier this summer. There are a small number of items for which there is a charge (such as rubble, plasterboard, soil and tyres) but most household items are accepted from batteries, paint, card, wood, green waste etc and Padworth is open between 12.30 to 6pm in the week and from 8am to 6pm at weekends. Don't forget to take your permit or proof that you are a resident of West Berkshire! For more details see the Council's website www.westberks.gov.uk

Last year there was a proposal to realign our parliamentary constituency boundaries and a lengthy consultation process followed. The general idea was to reduce the number of MPs and take account of population growth but there was a proposal that Bucklebury could move from the Newbury Constituency to Reading West which would mean losing Richard Benyon as our MP and becoming part of Alok Sharmas' constituency (as we stand at the last election). Many of us wrote to the Boundary Commission expressing concern that most of our residents look more to Newbury for services and shopping etc than Reading. For a long time there was no further information and there was a rumour that the whole process was unlikely to happen, but on 5th September the Commission sent a report to MPs which included this change, much to our surprise! We realise that for many people there may be little discernible change apart from a different MP from the next general election if the proposed changes are accepted but as we have been part of the Newbury constituency for many years we are sad that the Boundary Commission has not taken local views more into account. The matter is now in the hands of our MPs so if you feel you need to make your opinion known we suggest you contact Richard Benyon. benyon@parliament.uk

Harts Hill is now open and the final connections to the new water supply are being made as this is being written. I have been campaigning on behalf of the parish for this replacement for over 30yrs! We realise that accessing Thatcham has not been easy this summer for all our

residents but Thames Water have at least finished the main part of the work ahead of schedule after a shaky start when little seemed to be happening. Thank you to all residents for their patience; hopefully we will now enjoy a reliable water supply after many years of reduced water pressure and numerous pipe failures. There is still going to be some minor disruption at the Thatcham end of Harts Hill (temporary traffic lights occasionally) when the new water pumps, complete with back-up power generators, are commissioned this autumn.

Bucklebury Community Bus

Bucklebury Community Bus, with its smart dark blue paintwork and easily recognisable logo, is a common sight in Upper Bucklebury during term time, where it is to be seen transporting our local children and students to Thatcham to attend Kennet School. It also brings children up from Thatcham to attend Bucklebury Primary School. You may also have seen it transporting parishioners from Upper Bucklebury to and from Bucklebury Beerfest.

What is probably not so well known is that the minibus is available for community use in the evenings, at weekends and during the school holidays. An eligible driver is anyone with a category D1 on their clean licence, which in practical terms means you passed your test before 1st Jan 1997. If you are planning to go somewhere with a group of people, up to 16 passengers, you should find that it is very much cheaper than any of the alternatives. We ask for £1.50 per mile with a minimum of £45, but if you have a full bus, you are welcome to ask for a donation per head as it all adds up to helping to keep us running. History of Bucklebury (Cecilia Millson)

After the war, when she and her husband came to live in Bucklebury, Mrs. Cecilia Millson produced some historical scenes for the Women's Institute. In her research she had to delve into the history of Bucklebury and in doing so she became interested personally. Mrs. Millson kindly agreed to write a series of articles on Bucklebury for the magazine and were first printed cir 1973.

Part X

In July 1911 the Parish Church was closed for restoration work, and services were held in the Old Manor Kitchen. Although the work was sufficiently advanced for services to be held on Christmas Day, the official re-opening took place on Saturday February 17th 1912, when the Bishop of Oxford dedicated the Pulpit, Reading Desk, Faldstool, and the East Window, and gave the address at the Thanksgiving Service. The Reverend Thorp recorded in detail the alterations and additions made to the Church, in the March magazine, from which I quote the following extracts:



St. Mary's Church before restoration.

"A clean sweep has been made of all the deal pews, and also the deal pulpit.

The Jacobean benches have been carefully preserved and repaired.

The deal casing has been stripped off the massive old benches in the North aisle.

A few old tiles were found when excavating in the North aisle; these have been carefully preserved and re-set in the Chancel.

The west Arch behind the gallery has been opened, and serves the double purpose of giving more light to the gallery and allowing the ringing Chamber to be well aired and heated.

The following are the new additions:

The whole system of heating has been changed, and the pipes extended to a new radiator in the Chancel, and a new radiator has been placed in the Gallery. The Pulpit has been made out of carved oak (Jacobean work) found in the Manor Farm Pew, which was hidden by many coats of paint and green baize. So we now have in place of the deal pulpit, one whose decorations are in keeping with the old Jacobean benches. A new Oak Reading Desk and Faldstool have been made, new oak standards with iron lamp brackets have been fitted to the pews to replace hanging lamps.

Mural frescoes were found; but the plaster was considered to be in such a bad state, that it was though unadvisable to proceed with uncovering the walls. To add to the beauty of the Church, the lady of the Manor, Mrs. Webley-Parry, has presented a stained glass window in the East End. The subject is the "Crucifixion" by Frank Brangwn, ARA. The portrayal of the figures, together with the richness of colouring, bring home to one the reality of the subject."

Note: A Faldstool is a folding stool or small desk for kneeling at prayer.

"Merry Tidbury" Beech

In the last edition of The Oaks, we referred to the "Merry Tidbury" beech as being "long gone"; we were wrong. When the last edition of The Oaks was distributed, the beech stood in all its splendor just off of Fanny's Lane (or Road as some believe it should be). But sadly, it has been a victim of this years warm, dry weather followed by one of the storms and is now no more.
